Adverb Clauses An adverb clause is a subordinate clause that modifies a verb, adjective, adverb, or verbal by telling where, when, in what manner, to what extent, under what conditions, or why. Adverb clauses are introduced by subordinate conjunctions such as *although*, *since*, *if*, *when*, *while*, *because*, and *where*.

ADVERB CLAUSES		
Modified Word	Example	
Verb	When I finish this letter, I will begin to prepare the budget.	
Adjective	I am lost if I don't read a newspaper every day.	
Adverb	The committee responded faster than we anticipated.	
Verbal	Laughing until tears appeared, Susan stepped into the lobby.
